

Patterns of Code Switching and Code Mixing: A Sociolinguistic Study on Khotta-Bangla Bilinguals

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ABSTRACT

Code switching is “the juxtaposition within the same speech exchange of passages of speech belonging to two different grammatical systems” (Gumperz 1982-59). Code switching and code mixing are two important terms in sociolinguistics. Code-switching is the mixing of words, phrases and sentences from two distinct grammatical systems while code-mixing aims at using two languages such that a third new code emerges in which elements from the two languages are incorporated into a structurally definable pattern. India being multilingual country, the code-switching and code-mixing phenomena are widespread. India is a land of 2000 ethnic groups using 1652 languages and dialects including 22 (+1) major languages listed in 8th schedule constitutions. In such a large country, code switching and code mixing of languages is inevitable due to close contact among the people of various groups and communities.

The present sociolinguistic study digs into the patterns of inter-sentential and intra-sentential code switching (CS) and code-mixing (CM) that are apparent in the speech of Khotta-Bangla bilinguals who have been staying in West Bengal. Apart from that, it also aims in the following two directions:

1. *Difference in the occurrences of inter-sentential and intra-sentential CS and CM irrespective of the informants who have been staying in Bihar, Jharkhand, India.*
2. *The effect of language proficiency on these patterns.*
